Monitoring Report Introduction

This report was prepared at the direction of the Board of Trustees of Barton County Community College. The purpose of the report is to provide evidence that the College is meeting **Board End 4: Recipients pursuing individual interests will be enriched** and the three criteria the Board established for Board End 4:

- 1. Individuals/students will experience various cultural activities.
- 2. Individuals/students will participate in College activities.
- 3. Intercollegiate athletics and other extracurricular programs and activities will improve the lives of the participants.

This report provides qualitative and quantitative evidence that people pursuing individual interests at Barton are being enriched. For thoroughness and in keeping with proper research methodology, this report uses multiple forms of measurement as evidence. For clarity the multiple measures used as evidence have been organized and are presented in three sections. Each section provides evidence of the College's achievements corresponding to one of the three criteria created by the Board of Trustees and cited above.

The first section provides quantitative evidence that the College has an active program through which individuals/students are experiencing various cultural activities through the College. In this context, the term "cultural activities" has been interpreted in its traditional sense to mean activities relating to the visual and performing arts.

The second section provides quantitative evidence that the individuals/students participate in College activities. In this context, the term "College activities" has been interpreted to mean College sponsored events other than traditional instruction or visual and performing arts.

All three sections provide quantitative evidence that the intercollegiate athletics and other extracurricular programs and activities improve the lives of the participants. The first and second sections provide this evidence through the use of qualitative data embedded in the discussions of the criterion. The third section addresses only the third criterion and provides the evidence through the use of quantitative data.

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End 4 Statement: Recipients pursuing individual interests will be enriched.

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Section I: Executive Summary

This section provides evidence concerning Criterion 1 of End 4. Specifically, this section provides evidence that Barton County Community College contributes to individuals/students experiencing cultural activities. As mentioned in the introduction to this report, the term "cultural activities" has been interpreted in its traditional sense to mean activities relating to the visual and performing arts.

Based on this interpretation, the participation evidence presented herein, consists of qualitative and quantitative data on four areas: the L.E. "Gus" and Eva Shafer Memorial Art Gallery; the Department of Arts & Sciences Cultural Productions; the Trio/Student Support Services Programs; and the Silver Cougar Club Cultural Programs.

The data on each of these areas is reported in the same format. The report starts with a narrative describing the particular program. The report then addresses participation in the program through the use of quantitative data. Finally, where available, the report provides evidence of the enriching value of the program through the use of qualitative data.

The data in this section indicate that in the latest year complete data is available, Academic Year 2005-2006, **857 individuals/students** participated in Barton sponsored cultural activities. The data also indicate that for the same period over **8,773 individuals/students** attended Barton sponsored events. Based on these data it can be concluded that Barton county Community College contributes to individuals/students experiencing cultural activities.

The L.E. "Gus" and Eva Shafer Memorial Art Gallery

The L.E. "Gus" and Eva Shafer Memorial Art Gallery mission states: The Shafer Memorial Art Gallery exists to advance the cultural and educational opportunities of students and the community.


The mission of the gallery is intertwined with Ends Statement #4 in that the gallery provides opportunities for individuals and students to experience various cultural activities. Specifically the gallery presents visual art exhibits which provide personal enrichment for our campus community of students, High School students, Middle School students, Grade School students and fellow citizens. Evidence that the Gallery has fulfilled its mission and contributed to the accomplishment of Ends Statement #4 includes:

- 80,706 individuals have visited the gallery over the past 14 years (1992 2006) to view the exhibits;
- 59,121 individuals have visited the gallery over the past 10 years (1996 -2006) to view the exhibits;
- 662 Barton students have participated in the annual Barton County Community
 College Student Juried Art Exhibit from 1996 2006;
- Barton students have entered a total of 1,803 art works in this competition;
- 2,053 Barton students have participated in classroom visits to the gallery from 1996 2006;
- 2,939 Barton County High School students have participated in the annual Barton County High School Juried Art Exhibit from 1996 2006;
- 5,751 Barton County High School and Middle School students visited the gallery from 1996 2006;
- 14,888 Grade School students have visited the gallery from 1996 2006;
- A variety of educational experiences have been provided by the gallery which have included lectures, slide presentations, gallery talks, workshops, booksignings and performances; and
- The gallery has scheduled tours with interested groups and allowed the gallery to be used for meetings and ceremonies.




L. E. "Gus" and Eva Shafer Memorial Art Gallery Attendance




Number of Barton Art Students Entering Annual Student Exhibit




Number of Barton Students Visiting the Gallery with Their Classes




Number of Local High School Students Visiting the Gallery

Specifically, in the Fall semester of academic year 2006-7, the Department of Liberal Arts & Sciences sponsored one stage play, nine concerts, and two student recitals.



This section of the report provides both quantitative and qualitative data regarding TRIO/SSS program.


Quantitative Data on Trio Program


Trio/SSS Participants Involved in Cultural Enrichment Activities:



This section reports on SCC cultural events. A later section will address the classes associated with the SCC.


Quantitative Data on Silver Cougar Club


Silver Cougar Club Membership




Number of Silver Cougar Club Events

Section II: Executive Summary

This section provides evidence concerning Criterion 2 of End 4. Specifically, this section provides evidence that individuals/students participate in College activities. As mentioned in the introduction to this report, the term "College activities" has been interpreted to mean College sponsored events other than traditional instruction or visual and performing arts activities.

Based on this interpretation, the evidence presented herein consists of qualitative and quantitative data on four areas: Athletics; Academic Extracurricular Activities from within the Department of Liberal Arts and Sciences; Student Life Activities; Silver Cougar Club Academic Activities, and Student Ambassador Activities.

The data on each of these areas is reported in the same general format. The report starts with a narrative describing the particular activity. The report then addresses participation in the activity through the use of quantitative data. Finally, when available, the report then provides evidence of the enriching value of the activity through the use of qualitative data.

The data in this section indicate that in the latest year complete data is available, Academic Year 2005-2006, over **465** individuals/students participated in Barton sponsored extracurricular activities. The data also indicate for the same period that the attendance for Barton sponsored extracurricular activities and sports was over **17,552**. Based on these data it can be concluded that individuals/students participate in and attend activities sponsored by Barton County Community College.

Barton County Community College Athletics Overview

The athletic department at Barton County Community College is comprised of seven men's sports, eight women's sports, a spirit squad, an athletic training staff, and the Cougarettes (ambassadors for athletic events). The college employs twenty-four individuals (non-students) within the athletic department and two others who work outside the athletic department but have duties which are assigned to athletics (Sports Information Director and HPER Secretary).

The mission and goals of the Barton Athletic Program are as follows:

Barton County Community College Athletic Program Mission

The athletic program is an integral part of the educational program of the College and improves the lives of students through their participation as athletes and as spectators. Athletics provides unique educational opportunities to develop student physical, social, and academic skills. Students learn the values of teamwork, discipline, commitment, and sportsmanship.

In addition, athletics strengthens the campus community as well as the larger community served by the College by providing a positive, shared and unifying experience.

The primary goals of the athletic program are to:


- Assist student athletes in securing a college education


The athletic program, individual sports, and their leadership will be evaluated on how well they achieve the athletic mission and goals.



Silver Cougar Club




Number of Silver Cougar Club Classes

Student Ambassadors

Overview:

The mission of the Student Ambassadors is to serve and represent Barton County Community College in many capacities. The Student Ambassadors serve as representatives of the College by conducting and scheduling campus tours, participating in recruitment activities both on and off campus, assist with daily operations of the Admissions/marketing Office, and by being representatives through being an example of good citizenship.

Student Ambassadors are selected for interviews from a pool of applicants. Applicants submit one letter of recommendation, a written one-page essay explaining why he/she wants to be a Student Ambassador and why he/she would be an excellent choice, and must be available to work between 8-10 hours per week including an occasional evening and/or weekend.

Student Ambassadors are paid hourly and employed based on performance and are evaluated on a semester by semester basis.

Quantitative Data on Student Ambassadors

The 2006-07 Student Ambassador program has 13 Student Ambassadors. On average it will have 12 Ambassadors, but the number may vary from semester to semester.

2.95 combined average GPA of the Student Ambassadors through the Fall 2006 semester.

85% Attendance/participation rate at Student Ambassador meetings

4.5 out of 5 possible rating on level of personal enrichment survey

Becoming a member of the Student Ambassador program has added to my personal enrichment:

- Meet more people
- Get involved or become more involved in campus activities
- More confident in myself
- More confident in speaking to other people
- Aided my transition from high school to college
- Increased confidence with communication skills
- Opened more doors (i.e., opportunities) for myself
- Increases self confidence

Skills and experiences gained from being a Student Ambassador:

Section III: Executive Summary

This section provides evidence concerning Criterion 3 of End 4. Specifically, this section provides evidence that intercollegiate athletics and other extracurricular programs and activities improve the lives of the participants.

Quantitative Data from CCSSE

The CCSSE survey is an assessment tool given to a sample of students every other year. The survey asks students about their college experiences — how they spend their time; what they feel they have gained from their classes; what kinds of work they are challenged to do; how the college supports their learning; and so on. By correlating questions about participation in college activities with a series of questions which would reflect a life improvement; we were able to see a moderately strong positive correlation between the two. To summarize, the data indicate that the more students participated in college activities, the higher they rated their life improvement by attending Barton. Based on this it may be inferred that intercollegiate athletics and other extracurricular programs and activities improved the lives of the participants.
