This issue's Participant of the Fall Quarter,

Waianae, Hawaii, where she graduated from
high school in 2017. Shortly after
graduation, she moved to Fort Riley, Kansas
to follow her husband to his duty station. It
was here that she started taking classes at
Barton Community College and first heard
about the services available through the
Central Kansas Educational Opportunity
Center (CKEOC).

When Danielle was having difficulty navigating the financial aid verification

process, staff at the Army Education Center encouraged her to contact CKEOC and ask them for help. She followed up on this suggestion and the CKEOC staff was able to guide her through the process. In a subsequent appointment, CKEOC was able to assist Danielle with completing a FAFSA (Free Application Federal Student Aid) when she transferred to Columbus State University after graduating from Barton Community College in 2019. When asked about her experience with CKEOC, Danielle stated "They are amazing and I would recommend them to everyone."

Since her last appointment, Danielle and her husband have had a Permanent Change of Station (PCS) to a new home in Georgia and is set to graduate from Columbus State University with a Bachelor's degree in Public Relations at the conclusion of the Fall semester.

While reflecting on her college experience so far, she indicates that her experience at Barton Community College was "Great!" she goes on to say that "Barton got my foot in the door for college, it was affordable and the entire faculty and staff was really helpful and nice." She also reflects fondly on her time at Columbus State University – especially the two internships she has had: first at the nonprofit organization Feeding the Valley Food Bank, and then at WRBL Channel 3 News.





Looking at the future, Danielle hopes to continue her education and pursue a graduate degree at either California State University, San Bernardino or Arizona State University in Fall 2022. In the meantime, she works as a Social Media Coordinator at a law firm and hopes to stay in media and communication. It is obvious that her internships have had a profound effect on her goals as she imparts: "In five years, I hope I'm working at a news station or being a creative director at a nonprofit organization."

Looking back on her college experience, Danielle recalls how demanding and gratifying it has been and how accomplished it makes her feel, exclaiming "I'm going to be the first person from my entire family to graduate with a Bachelor's degree this semester!" Despite all the challenging work, Danielle carves out time to spend with her husband and three pug boys and occasionally enjoys working on her vlog and enjoying iced coffee.

The Central Kansas Educational Opportunity Center (CKEOC) staff has spent the past couple months keeping busy with professional development! Recently, CKEOC Coordinators/Advisors Jamie Hatfield and Kendall Meyer along with Program Director Ray Kruse attended conferences in both Boston, MA and Atlanta, GA. TRIO Priority 5 Training was the purpose of the Boston trip, in which our staff acquired new knowledge on working with and recruiting participants from notoriously hard-to-reach demographics. The skills obtained from this training will benefit the EOC staff by providing strategies to connect with potential participants from the diverse population we serve.

The 40th annual Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) national conference was held in Atlanta, GA this September. COE is a non-profit organization dedicated to

furthering college opportunities for low-income and first generation populations, as well as students with disabilities. COE is mostly made up of TRIO professionals from across the country. The training included TRIO updates from U.S. Department of Education representatives in Washington DC and included a vast variety of breakout sessions on topics such as: working with different TRIO populations, mental health, utilizing different forms of technology and media, and financial literacy. The staff obtained a gold mine of information and resources from these events and is excited to utilize these skills to further improve our program and services provided to our valuable participants!

Director's Corner

The Central Kansas Educational Opportunity Center (CKEOC) is a federal TRIO grant program that is 100% funded by the U.S. Department of Education. TRIO programs are funded for five year cycles and our current grant has funding through August 2022. In February, we submitted a proposal to extend our grant through August 2027. We are happy to announce that our proposal was approved and we received notification that we will have continued funding.

In the approved proposal, we elected to add the counties Reno and McPherson to our target area. Even though we still have one year left on our current grant cycle before our new funding starts, we have received permission from the Department of Education to begin serving the communities in these counties immediately.

TRIO programs provide free services to individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds in an effort to assist them with the attainment of a post-secondary education. The services that are available through participation in our grant include, but are not limited to: career exploration, financial literacy training, researching post-secondary programs, Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) assistance, assistance with navigating the admissions process, and more. Since our inception in 1998, we have helped our participants go to over 700 different colleges and universities spanning every state in the country.
