BARTON'S "COUGAR SUPPLY DEN" HELPS STUDENTS IN NEED

Some college students have more to think about these days than going to classes and maintaining good grades. Some worry about where their next meal is coming from. To ease that concern, Barton Community College established a food pantry that offers quality food and necessities for free. Beginning this semester, the pantry upgraded to a new location with a new name, the Cougar Supply Den (CSD).

Vice President of Student Services Angie Maddy says the College has noticed the increasing needs of students.

"It's been pretty widely reported on the national front that an increasing number of college students faced significant need in terms of food, and basic necessities like shampoo, toothpaste, or bed sheets for a dorm mattress," she said. "We've noted that with increasing frequency here at Barton as well. Over many years the concept of a 'basic needs supply closet' had been discussed at Barton."

The Barton Food Pantry opened in 2017 and has continued to grow throughout the years. Central Kansas Upward Bound Project Director Patrick Busch is the founder and one of the volunteers for the CSD. He said usage of the resource has been increasing.

"We have over 200 entries each month," he said. "Since we started the pantry in 2017, it has supplied 20,000 pounds of food. Our check-in data shows that students have used the service over 3,000 times."

The CSD is in the Learning Resource Center on the Great Bend campus. It now provides food, water, personal care items, Barton clothing, bedding supplies and cookware. All items are completely free to all students taking classes on campus. Any student can contact the office staff in student services to gain access.

Several Barton employee volunteers help run the supply den. They make sure there are steady donations from various organizations from the local community and beyond. Once the food and supplies arrive, the staff organize and clean the items before they made their way to the supply room.

Maddy said she is proud of the volunteers and all their efforts.

"Patrick Busch was really the driving force behind bringing this long-discussed concept to life," she said. "The project has grown in amazing ways over the past few years and has proven to be incredibly beneficial to our students on the Barton County campus."

Isabella Guedes is one of the many students that have benefited.

"When I got to Barton, I couldn't believe we had a place where I would have free drinks and food," she said. "This project helped me a lot. If it wasn't for this resource, I would have had more difficulties during the semester when I couldn't work."

Because of the experience Guedes had, she now became one of the student helpers who assists other Barton students access to the CSD.

Central Kansas Upward Bound Academic Coordinator Nolan Esfeld and Co-Founder of the CSD encourages all students to take advantage of their services.

"We're trying to remove all the obstacles, so students don't have to worry about the food necessities, the major hygiene necessities, and the clothing stuff," he said.



CLARENCE AND JEANNETTE HAAK MEMORIAL ENDOWMENT

Upon the passing of Clarence Haak in January of 2021, the Barton Community College Foundation became the beneficiary of a \$50,000 bequest to establish an endowment for the benefit of students pursuing a nursing degree from Barton.

Clarence was born and raised on a farm near Great Bend. After farming with his dad and brother he began working for the Automotive Parts Company of Great Bend and then for Midlands Automotive out of Omaha, Nebraska as their regional manager in Great Bend.

In 1954 he married his lifelong sweetheart, Jeanette, and in 1968 they moved to Denver, Colorado where Clarence continued to work in the automotive field. Even though residents of Denver, both Clarence and Jeanette were very pleased that Barton Community College was opened in 1969 and they continued to follow its growth from its modest beginnings to the outstanding community college it is today.

Prior to this endowment, Clarence supported an annually funded scholarship named for his wife, Jeannette, also for those students majoring in nursing. The first Clarence and Jeannette Haak Memorial Scholarship will be awarded from this new endowment for the 2022-23 academic year.



LINDSEY BOGNER JOINS BARTON COMMUNITY COLLEGE FOUNDATION AS NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The Barton Community College Foundation has been raising money and managing endowments for scholarships and enhancements to the college for more than five decades. Lindsey Bogner, the next Executive Director of the Foundation, is hard at work absorbing as much knowledge as she can from the current director, Coleen Cape, who will retire in January. "Working with Coleen has been a great experience; we are so lucky to be able to spend so much time together before she retires," Bogner said. "She has been at the College for 27 years and her expertise and mentorship are a boon that brings a deeper level of understanding, putting me on the right track." Bogner comes to the college with years of experience serving as the Foundation and Community Education Director at the Ellinwood Hospital & Clinic, and as a Communications Coordinator for the Clara Barton Hospital and Foundation. She holds a master's degree in management and leadership from Western Governors University.

She said she's excited for the possibilities in the future and already has some ideas for new initiatives, but she's easing into the job slowly.

"I really want to focus on making what we have more successful," she said. "The first order of business for me is to evaluate all of the events and programs and see if there are any changes that we can make before creating something new."

She said the "secret sauce" is the quality of the team she will be leading, including Administrative Assistant Amy Wheeler and Business and Accounting Specialist Donna McCormick. "Donna and Amy are amazing, and with our mix of personalities, we are going to make a great team," Bogner said. "They've got the know-how and the heart for everything the Foundation does."

Speaking of heart, Bogner said she finds tremendous purpose in her role as the next leader of the foundation.

"I wake up and I get to help someone accomplish their goals every day," she said. "Whether that is helping a donor set up an endowment or scholarship to recognize their loved one, giving a student a scholarship so they can get an education, or supporting the faculty and staff in their work, I have the opportunity to help make things happen. That is an amazing feeling and I love doing it."

In addition to her experience and credentials, Bogner is a US Army veteran and is highly involved in the community. She is a member of the Hines-Gossman American Legion Post #320 of Ellinwood. She serves on the Action Team for the Barton Arts Movement, is a member of Barton County Young Professionals, and volunteers as a Kansas Hunter Education Instructor for the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks. Lindsey lives near Odin, with her husband Mark, and their two children, Zoey and Otto.

FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS

MORE THAN A DEGREE - MORE THAN A DIPLOMA

The Barton Community College Foundation awarded \$305,757 in academic scholarships to 241 students for the 2021-22 academic year. Students are chosen through the application process and the funds are in addition to any other community awards, college GPA awards or performance awards.

Scholarships are open to traditional and non-traditional students, taking face-to-face, online or fusion classes. Foundation scholarships are available to full-time and part-time students and because of the growing on-line demographic, more scholarships are offered to students globally than ever before.

During the 25 years I have been with the foundation, the scope of the mission and vision of what we offer our students has changed for me. That change is one of the reasons that this position has become a passion for me and not just a job. I have come to know and see first-hand that what we offer goes beyond the realm of financial assistance, what we offer is hope, self-esteem, personal awareness and the opportunity to make life-long friends.
