## Dr. Mary Davidson Cohen Honored by Foundation

"This place...this community...this college provides opportunity for men and women of all colors, genders, and beliefs who pass through the doors." said Dr. Mary Cohen in her written statement as she was hon-

"...we take care of our own." ored by the Barton Community College Foundation as the 2013 Distinguished Service Award recipient. In regard to the many ways she has supported the college she says there is not a better legacy she could leave. "Awards mean a lot,

but they don't say it all. What really matters is the fact that Barton Community College is deserving of my gift and the gifts that all of you have provided and will provide in the future." Dr. Cohen also made the comment "In great measure this college is the spine of the community of Great Bend. It represents the spirit of Kanas...we take care of our own."

The Distinguished Service Award was created in 1981 by the Barton Community College Foundation to recognize individuals who have shown genuine regard for, and have performed outstanding service to Barton Community College. The Barton Foundation Board of Directors selects the recipient from nominations received.

Dr. Cohen received a doctorate in education administration from the University of Kansas in 1977. In 2002, she began serving as the Secretary for Education's Regional Representative under Secretary Rod Paige. As the secretary's regional representative, Cohen served as the department's liaison to state and local education agencies, public and private schools, colleges and universities, elected representatives of local and state government organizations and a variety of other education stakeholders. Needless to say, her ties to the education world are extensive and she understands the value of Barton Community College.

Foundation Director Darnell Holopirek said Dr. Cohen is very deserving of the award. "Mary really

sees how important philanthropy is, and we are blessed that she has chosen Barton to be a benefactor of her gifts, not only financially but through friendship, enthusiasm and encouragement," Holopirek said.

In 2005, Dr. Cohen and her late husband



Bart exhibited extreme generosity by donating their extensive collection of Kansas history literature that is housed in the Learning Resource Center in a dedicated space they also funded, which is called The Cohen Center for Kansas History. They also established an endowment for maintenance of the center and the collection it houses. Their commitment to this project inspired the complete renovation of the Learning Resource Center by the college in 2008, a project they also helped support. Today, the Cohen Center for Kansas History boasts one of the most extensive collections of research resources in the state. The center is open to not only Barton students, but community members as well.

Holopirek said the college's relationship with the Cohen's has been mutually beneficial. "They fell in love with Barton and Barton has fallen in love with them," she said.

Since Bart's death in 2006, Mary has continued her support of and generosity to Barton Community College; most recently with a very generous unrestricted gift to be used at the discretion of the Foundation Board of Directors.

"Mary has continued to support almost every endeavor that we have," Holopirek said of Mary's continued dedication to the college. "She has truly gained our respect and devotion, and embodies everything that a true philanthropist is."

## 6th Annual Foundation Clay Shoot Results Above Expectations

In the beginning the goal wasn't to be the largest oneday shoot in the state of Kansas, but it sure makes the Foundation Board of Directors proud to think we have created an event that continues to generate more involvement by sponsors and the attendees who come to shoot. We had 176 pre-registrations and 160 actual shooters, which makes this our third straight year of claiming our fame by having such a large shoot.

More importantly, it is what we do with the proceeds that make us realize we are making great things happen.

Each fall we offer the Barton faculty mini-grants from the funds which are raised at our April clay shoot. The faculty members complete an application and a committee of our directors selects the recipients. It is a joy for

us to hear an instructor make a comment that he/she plans on ap-

plying for this grant because over the years the faculty has been able to utilize these funds for special equipment or instruction materials they can use in their classrooms. The criterion is that they must

enhance their student's learning experience by the purchase of an item(s) which may not be available in the faculty's capacity to otherwise purchase. We had net proceeds of almost \$14,000 this year so we will be able to assist our students with many different options by awarding their faculty some wonderful opportunities.

Our sponsorship increased this year and we had shooters from 29 Kansas communities and two from out of state (California and Colorado). Reaching out to new friends of Barton is definitely happening with



this enjoyable activity. We have participants come back each year and yet we always have new ones who join the fun. There is a great atmosphere at LaSada's Sporting Clay facility and it's a wonderful fun-filled day of competition along with camaraderie among the attendees.

## Interactive Training Lab

We may live in a rural area but thanks to futuristic technology and the donors who support Barton Community College's Criminal Justice department; our regional service area will have a wonderful training opportunity. The USE-OF-FORCE SIMULATOR is an interactive training simulator that incorporates the entire force-option spectrum with a unique feature set that allows for total customization of the training environment. Every split second decision comes from a lifetime of training!


The video play allows scenarios to unfold depending on the trainee's reactions, skill level and observation skills. The lab is a training program that will give the instructors the flexibility to create and edit customized video scenarios to fit the needs of the different emergency responders within our service area. It allows a series of scenes produced for a specified training session and there are more than 400 pre-programmed scenarios which come with the equipment.

The local groups that donated funds to purchase the Ti Training equipment were invited to attend a demonstration of the technology and all of the agencies understand the value this will bring to their employees and communities. The equipment was purchased with the assistance of donations from the Lee Turner Endowment through the Barton Foundation, Rush County Attorney's Office, Rush County Sheriff's Dept., Russell County Attorney's Office, Russell County Sheriff's Dept., City of Great Bend, Barton County Attorney's Office, Ellinwood Police Dept., City of Hoisington, Pawnee County Attorney's Office, and P&S Security.

Barton will use the technology to train its criminal justice students, and it will also be available for local police departments and sheriff's offices for continuing education opportunities.
