

Community Welcomes New Barton Welding Lab

A standing-room-only crowd from the community, campus and area high schools welcomed Barton's new welding lab January 28 for a Great Bend Chamber of Commerce Coffee and Ribbon Cutting. College President Dr. Carl Heilman welcomed the crowd of about 200. He noted that financial, consulting and equipment support from Murphy Family Enterprises, Inc., the Great Bend office of AirGas, Inc., and Scott's Welding were crucial to creation of the state-of-the art lab.

Heilman said that community business leaders asked for a welding program several years ago. The result is

a full first class of 23 students. After just one semester, students will receive a nationally recognized certificate making them instantly employable, he noted.

"The Foundation exists to support the college and to prudently manage gifts from the community for the benefit of the college and students," said Nancy Wiebe, Foundation director. "Ultimately these gifts improve the economic and cultural vitality of the region. The Foundation is proud to help with this important initiative."

Charlie Brown Funds Life Sciences Scholarship

Charlie Brown spent his career teaching biological sciences to Great Bend High School (GBHS) and Barton Community College students. Now Charlie is continuing his legacy of teaching and caring about students by establishing the Charlie Brown Life Sciences Scholarship at the Foundation beginning fall 2016.

Charlie grew up in the coal mining town of Ligonier, PA, and was recruited to Kansas via Sterling College. At Sterling he was the football guarterback and also played baseball and basketball. He was elected to the college's Hall of Fame in 1998. Charlie did not want to impose lots of conditions on his Barton scholarship recipient, saying that "Sterling College never gave up" on him.

Charlie taught biology at GBHS from 1955 to 1971. He recently attended a GBHS 50th reunion to mingle with his former students, "kids who are now 68" he said in amazement. In 1965 he was the first teacher selected for the Outstanding Young Educator Award from the Great Bend Chamber of Commerce.


After taking a year off to earn a master's degree from Penn State University, Charlie returned to GBHS. In 1970 he joined the faculty at Barton during its second year of classes. He was one of the first Barton faculty to win the Outstanding Instructor Award in 1985. Charlie went on to teach 23 years at the college, retiring in 1993.

Charlie met his first wife, Carol, at Sterling College. They have four daughters, all graduates of GBHS. After the deaths of their spouses, he married Ruth, who




