ABOUT THE PROGRAM

This program is designed to provide training and formal education for those entering the emergency management field as well as those currently in the field who require additional training and education. A large percentage serve as part time emergency managers with their full-time position being law enforcement. A student may receive credit for work experience, military experience, military schools and civilian education. Credits are awarded based on the American Council on Education ACE Guide.

WHAT EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT WORKERS DO

Emergency managers are a vital part of the preparation and procedure development for responding to natural disasters or other emergencies. They also help lead the response during and after emergencies. An emergency manager will often work in coordination with public safety officials, elected officials, non-profit organizations and government agencies.

WORK ENVIRONMENT

The majority of emergency managers work for state or local governments. However, others may work for private companies, hospitals or non-profit organizations.

BECOME AN EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PROFESSIONAL

Emergency managers typically need a degree as well as work experience in emergency response, disaster planning and/or public administration.

PAY

The median annual wage for an emergency manager was \$72,760 in May 2017.

JOB OUTLOOK

Employment of emergency managers is projected to grow 8 percent from 2016 to 2026, about as fast as the average for all occupations. The importance of preparing for and minimizing the risks from emergencies will help sustain demand and employment for these workers.

Certificate

The one-year Certificate Program offers a shorter path to students looking to get into the career field of Emergency Management. Successful completion of the Certificate program requires a minimum of 34 credit hours.

ADVISING

Academic Advisors generally work by appointment, however they do accept walk-ins. New students seeking a preliminary degree plan to be written should bring to the appointment/walk-in copies of transcripts from prior colleges and universities, CLEP/DSST, AARTS, ERB, or DD-214 and certificates of all employer based training they want to be evaluated for credit.

COLLEGE PROGRAMS

Evening College that consists of both Hybrid and Non-hybrid classes for both civilian and military students that meet three hours each class, two days a week for eight weeks or once a week for three hours and then online. The cost for these courses is \$104 per credit hour.
