

### *Dare to know*

#### **Epic Fiction**

*Fiction depicting action on a broad scale and often characterized by grandiose treatment of individual and/or national destiny.*

A genre in which the narrative focuses simultaneously on the lives of the characters and on a pivotal moment in the history of a social or national grouping, no matter its size. These stories often involve a scope and themes that are grand in scale, language that is descriptive and colorful, a protagonist who is larger than life, and a tone that emphasizes the magnificence of the events. Another key feature of the epic novel is a large amount of detail, which emphasizes emotional points and allows readers to experience the setting. Many newer stories combine an intimate style of narration that accentuates character development with the sweeping events that comprise much of the plot. Epic fiction can easily blend with **domestic fiction**, **fantasy fiction**, **historical fiction**, **Western fiction**, and other genres. Virgil's *The Aeneid* (19 BC), the unknown author's *Beowulf* (700-1000 AD), and John Milton's *Paradise Lost* (1667) are early examples of the epic poem. Nathaniel Hawthorne's *Tanglewood Tales* (1853), Victor Hugo's *Les Misérables* (1862), Fyodor Dostoevsky's *The Brothers Karamazov* (1880), James Joyce's *Ulysses* (1922), Sholem Asch's *Three Cities* (1933), and Olivia Manning's *The Great Fortune* (1960) are classic examples of the epic novel.
