True Crime Comics

Comics that focus on real-life crimes, usually violent in nature, and the people involved in them. A genre which features graphic depictions of actual crime and violence. Following a similar and earlier craze in true detective pulp magazines and Hollywood gangster films, true crime comics were one of the most popular genres of the Golden Age during the 1940s and 1950s. These comics focus on gangsters, killers, armed robbers, petty thieves, and grifters, as well as police officers, detectives, and prosecutors. Stories are supposedly "ripped from the headlines" of newspapers or taken from official police reports. The realism of these accounts varies, and publishers once ran the risk of glorifying criminal activity in their competition to present lurid details and bizarre villains. Following the implementation of the Comic Code Authority, publishers were compelled to limit the sensationalism. Readers lost interest in these tamer stories, and true crime comics largely disappeared for nearly two decades. Lev Gleason Publications' Crime Does Not Pay (1942-1955); Alval Publishers' True Crime Comics (1947-1949); Prize Comics' Headline Comics (1947-1956) and Justice Traps the Guilty (1947-1958); Hillman Comics' Real Clue Crime Stories (1947-1953); EC Comics' Crime SuspenStories (1950-1955); Fox Feature Syndicates' Murder Incorporated (1948-1950); and Avon Comics' All True Detective Cases (1952-1954) are classic examples.
