Kansas Department of Commerce - Economic Overview - Local Area 1 (Western Kansas)

In 2015, the population in Local Area I was 596,569. Between 2005 and 2015, the region's population declined at an annual average rate of 0.1%.

The region has a civilian labor force of 308,600 with a labor participation rate of 65.9%. This is a decline of 0.3 percentage points from 3rd quarter 2016. Of individuals 25 to 64, 22.6% have a bachelor's degree or higher, which compares with 31.3% in the nation.

The median household income increased by \$432 to \$47,714 and the value of a median house went up by \$2,882 to \$97,163. The table below shows information on the demographic statistics.


Changes in College Enrollments
