FACULTY, STAFF, AND FRIENDS EXHIBIT AUGUST 25, 2015 – SEPTEMBER 25, 2015

The featured artists were Louise Fenn and faculty Ceramics Instructor Bill Forst. Fenn says, "My work has been strongly influenced by impressionism and expressionism, but I finally found a word that may describe some of my creations – 'recyclism.'

Describing his work, Forst says "...I find great satisfaction in making objects that become a part of the lives of the people who use them."

FIRE: INSTALLATION BY BENTLY SPANG OCTOBER 9, 2015 – NOVEMBER 6, 2015

For this exhibit, Spang tells the story of the 2012 Ash Creek Fire that blackened 250,000 acres and destroyed his family's ranch located on their ancestral homeland on the Northern Cheyenne Reservation in Montana. Spang makes the voices of the trees concrete through video documentation, performance art and a series of expressive drawings made by rubbing drawing paper across the ravaged boughs of the trees themselves. Spang said he experienced a cathartic moment and "a chance to grieve with the trees." The results are the haunting abstract images of the exhibit.

NEW QUILTS FROM AN OLD FAVOIRTE: NINE PATCH NOVEMBER 13, 2015 – DECEMBER 6, 2016

Quilters from many U.S. states and several other countries utilized the "nine patch" block designs in imaginative ways, providing a wonderful look at the skills, techniques and creativity of today's quilt-makers.

EXPOSURE TIME III JANUARY 15, 2016 – FEBRUARY 19, 2016

This exhibit displayed the work of area photographers, and was juried by Fred Lassmann of Augusta, who was the featured photographer in the exhibit. "Seeing beyond seeing' best defines my approach to photography. Simply stated, it means approaching the subject with a completely open mind." Dale Riggs won best of show with his *Ellinwood Fireman* photo.

REPURPOSED: JESSIE MONTES AND SCOTT THEIN FEBRUARY 26 – MARCH 24 2016

Jessie Montes created amazing folk art from corrugated cardboard. His ornate pieces range from small plaques to some up to six feet tall. Some pieces are three dimensional. The process consisted of arranging pieces of cardboard to create intense and almost tactile textures that make the artwork come to life.

Scott Thein obsessively draws the New York City cityscape on cast-off, uptown shopping bags. Thein's drawings become a web of "careful" observation and metaphor. They trace the journey of a shopping bag through various contexts that change its significance and meaning. Just as Thein transforms the meaning of the shopping bag through associations and metaphor making, he also alters its physical being with his incessant marking. He transforms the raw utilitarian paper into something soft, precious and ethereal, almost ghostlike.

BARTON STUDENT EXHIBITION APRIL 1- APRIL 23

Featured artist Esther Maher exhibited watercolor work as well as ceramics, and was the distinguished winner of the Shafer Gallery Student Lifetime achievement award. Virginia Kay Bitter won Best of Show with her *Crystal Pot*.

High School students from Great Bend, Hoisington, Ellinwood, and Larned participated in Vortex Day this year. Workshops this year included Ceramic sea creatures with instructor Bill Forst, Life Drawing with instructor Christina Lamoureaux, Storyboarding with instructor Scott Beahm, and Photographic lighting with instructor Chelsea Mitchell.

FROGS: SOUNDING THE FUTURE

A COLLABORATIVE EVENT BETWEEN THE SHAFER GALLERY AND THE KANSAS WETLANDS EDUCATION CENTER

The Shafer gallery partnered with KWEC to create an exhibit to raise awareness about frogs. Amphibians are the first creatures to show distress from environmental conditions, and so are a kind of canary in the coalmine. The exhibit features photographs from Vanishing Amphibians, series by National Geographic photographer Joel Sartore. These photos document endangered frogs and is part of the Photo Ark, his effort to document all animals currently in captivity before they go extinct. The exhibit also included an interactive frog song station, as well as educational programs and creative art projects.

Jilg presents large scale paintings of flowers alongside the large-format flower photographs of Leon Staab.


