WHAT IS BCUB?

- Barton County Upward Bound is a federally funded, college prep program for 60 low income and first generation high school students from Great Bend, Hoisington, and Ellinwood.
- The goal of Upward Bound is to increase the rate at which participants complete high school and enroll in and graduate from college.
- Throughout the school year students meet weekly with staff, attend cultural events, participate
 in workshops, perform community service, visit colleges, and complete tutoring hours.
- Students in BCUB participate in a six week residential summer program at Barton simulating the college experience. At the end of the six weeks, successful students are eligible for a weeklong trip out of state.
- BCUB is in its 4th year of a 5 year grant cycle.
- Recent budget increases bring year 4's budget to \$297,601 with a projected 5 year total of \$1,421,832.

- Serves Ellsworth, Lyons, Chase, Central Plains Claflin & Wilson High Schools
- 139 Students attended a post-secondary school of their choice
- 107 Students attended Barton Community College
- Our Academic Advisor Nolan is the product of Barton Community College and the Trio Programs.

FUNDING

Year 4 of a 5 year \$1,164,231.00 grant

Estimates of Funding for the previous 12 summers:

- \$120,000 on tuition fees for our graduated seniors to take 2 classes
- \$65,000 spent on renting Cottonwood/Bluestem
- \$80,000 spent on purchasing food Great Western Dining





EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY CENTERS

- 100% funded by U.S. Dept. Of Ed.
- Serve at least 1000 participants per year
- Provide free services to mentor students through postsecondary education processes
- Two thirds of students served must be both low income and first generation college students
- Target area includes 33 counties
- Partners: post-secondary institutions, local workforce centers, adult education centers, army education center, uso, soldier for life transition assistance program, & many more

- Student Support Services has been at Barton for over 25 years
- In 2020 we rewrote our Grant successfully and will receive \$367,531 annually for the next 5 years.
- 200 students served annually

OBJECTIVES FOR NEW FUNDING CYCLE

Persistence Rate:

- 55% of all participants served by the SSS project will persist from one academic year to the beginning of the next academic year or graduate and /or transfer from a 2 year to a 4 year institution
- Good Academic Standing:
 - 73% of all enrolled participants served by SSS project will meet the performance level required to stay in good academic standing
- 2 yr graduation rate:
 - 33% of new participants served each year will graduate with an associate's degree or certificate within 4-yrs

AND

- 2 yr transfer rate:
 - 13% of new participants served each year will transfer with an associate's degree or certificate within 4 yrs
